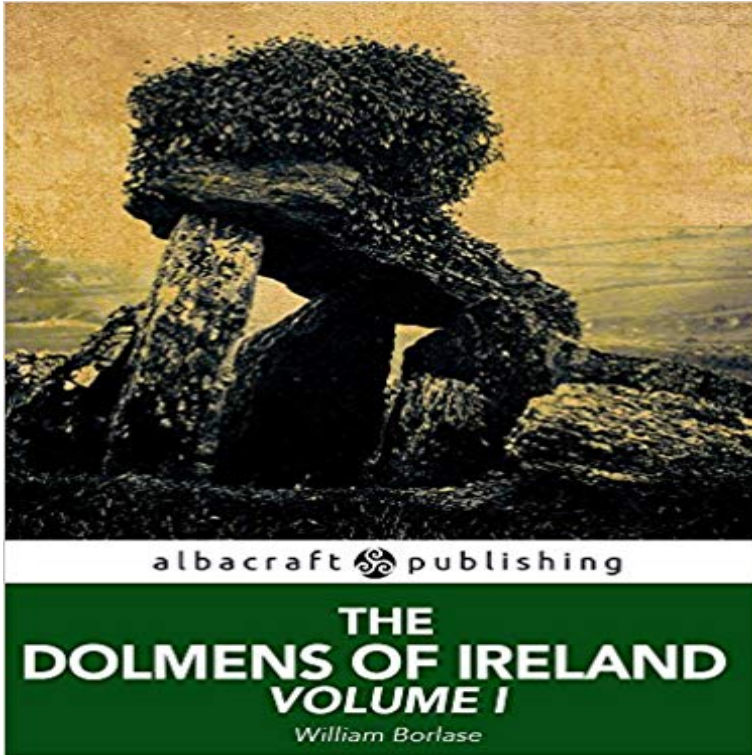


The Dolmens of Ireland: Volume I



Enigmatic and mysterious monuments, dolmens smatter the landscape of Ireland. Although they are thought to have been built as megalithic tombs, their exact purpose is still not known for certain. Built in the Neolithic period, up to 6,000 years ago, over the years they have been referred to as giants tables or druids altars, amongst other things, attracting many different stories concerning their mythical origins.
